Pastor Deb's Easter Epistle "Recognizing the Risen Christ"

How often have you passed by someone in the grocery store and wondered, "Do I know him"? Usually I need to locate them mentally in a church, organization or even the city where I met them. "Oh, I know you from the Presbyterian church." If we are honest, it is difficult to recognize people outside a certain sphere; we do not expect people from New York to appear on our travels and vacations. However, it has happened to me and I am sure you, too. In the same way, we do not expect Christ to show up outside of church, for instance at work, school or the grocery store. Yet the Risen Christ appeared to followers at the empty tomb (John 20:1-18), in a locked room (John 20:19-22), on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13), and on the Sea of Tiberius (John 21:1-14). Mary thought Jesus was the gardener until he spoke her name. The Emmaus travelers did not recognize Christ until they finished their journey and broke bread together. The isolated and fearful disciples recognized Christ when he blessed them with peace. Peter and six other disciples acknowledged Jesus Christ only after they captured a net full of fish. Once they recognized Jesus, these first followers witnessed to the Risen Christ with great jov.

The Easter Message is our witness to the resurrection of Christ. That is why we shout, "Christ is Risen!" It is such a glorious affirmation of our belief. So, plan on singing, "Alleluia!" as our thankful prayer and witness. We come to church to learn more about the Risen Christ and to consider the possibility of experiencing God/Christ/Spirit every day.

The Easter message this year is to "Expect the unexpected!" God breaks into our daily lives at work, at home, in our car commute, and at meals. Do not be surprised when Christ brings you a blessing of peace in the middle of your day.

I pray that during this Easter season, you will see Christ in unexpected places and during ordinary moments. I pray that we will all respond in faith and joy, "Christ is risen! He is risen! Indeed! Alleluia!"



COMPOSER'S CORNER

Thomas Matthews

Thomas Matthews was born in Utica, New York in 1915 and had a distinguished career as a church musician in Philadelphia, Chicago, and Tulsa. He also taught music at the Northwestern University School or Music and was Director of Music for Seabury-Western Theological Seminary. While in Tulsa, Dr. Matthews served on the faculty of the University of Tulsa. During his career he composed over 30 anthems including "The Lord is My Shepherd" and "The Day of Resurrection." Dr. Matthews was also a skilled improviser on organ. He died in 1999.

April 20, Easter Sunday, the Adult Choir will sing his anthem "The Day of Resurrection" with trumpet. The Adult Bells will also add their festive sounds to our joyful celebration that day.

Here is the text for Dr. Matthews' anthem:

The day of resurrection! Earth tell it out abroad; The Passover of gladness, The Passover of God. From death to life eternal, From earth unto the sky, Our Christ hath brought us over with hymns of victory.

Our hearts be pure from evil, That we may see aright The Lord in rays eternal of resurrection light; And, list'ning to His accents, May hear so calm and plain His own "All hail!" and hearing, May raise the victor strain.

Now let the heav'ns be joyful, Let earth her song begin, The round world keep high triumph, And all that is therein. Let all things seen and unseen Their notes together blend, For Christ the Lord is risen, Our joy that hath no end. Aleluia!

Dear Church Family,

It's officially Spring. I have seen Robins! It can get warm any time now. I have a pile of iced over snow parked on part of my garden that probably won't melt till July at this rate. Poor flowers!

This month we will look at PET scans. (No, this is not a scan for your dog Fido or your fish Bubbles.) PET stands for positron emission tomography. These scans use radioactive materials put into your body via IV, inhalation, or ingestion to show how your organs are working. PET scans allow us to see how organs use certain molecules (such as sugars, amino acids, water, oxygen, etc.). The molecules are attached to positron emitting radionuclides (a fancy name for "radioactive stuff", but don't you feel smart saying it?) FDG (a glucose molecule, a sugar, attached to "radioactive stuff") is commonly given to the person being scanned via IV. The patient then waits for approximately one hour for this to circulate to the organs being scanned. The machine itself is very similar to a CT scanner. The patient lies on a table that is pulled through a circular machine, which takes pictures. This may take up to an hour and is somewhat noisy with clicking and buzzing sounds.

A PET scan can be used to detect areas of decreased blood flow in the heart, find tumors (and determine if they are benign or cancerous), and evaluate brain abnormalities. The images that come back from a PET scan are brightly colored, unlike the gray and white CT and MRI images. The more chemical activity there is in an organ, the more radioactive material builds up. The more build up, the brighter the color. Cancer cells take up sugars at a rapid rate; they show up as bright colors. PET scans are more accurate in detecting larger, fast growing tumors. They also are frequently used to establish if a treatment for cancer is working (less bright colors in follow up scans indicate shrinking tumors). They often can show cancer tumors missed by a CT scan. However, PET scans are often done in tandem with CT scans as the CT shows a clearer outline of anatomical structures. Many machines made now have both PET and CT capabilities and can be done all at once.

Have you helped in the kitchen lately? One room in the church that receives much use throughout the week, as well on Sunday ,is our church kitchen. For example, this Lenten season there are two meals a week prepared there, the Wednesday breakfast and worship and the Friday Soup Supper and Study. We also had the Pancake Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday Potluck and

Communion, and Palm Sunday Auction coming up. During the week, the groups that use the church sometimes use it. The Boy Scouts use it for pancake breakfasts. There are too many others to list.

The kitchen is showing its age. We need to make safer working conditions. Anyone who has tried to prepare a meal for a group or clean up after anything knows the workflow pattern is a nightmare. There isn't enough storage, so items are inconveniently and dangerously stored on top of cupboards. The major appliances were purchased used in 1997 and we hope aren't on borrowed time. Most people are afraid to use the stove. Some repairs have been made "to get by" as a large investment in something that needs a major renovation does not seem cost effective.

So, for these reasons and many others Presbyterian Women, who are charged to oversee use of the kitchen, have been taking note of all the problems. Discussions started two years ago. Property Committee has also been aware for some time of needs in the kitchen. PW began working with a kitchen planner who has planned church kitchens before. We have a preliminary plan and are now looking at costing and funding. Property Committee and Session have agreed that a total kitchen renovation is needed. PW will keep you up-to-date as we progress.




