

There is a wonderful freedom that we Northerners experience when summer arrives. You can walk outside without scarves or hoods or wool coats. There is a sense of freedom to pursue outside projects of gardening, house maintenance and delayed creative efforts. When the sun is shining and the streets are dry, there are roads to explore and waters to sail. For me, there's anticipation of new places to explore and people to see. As my home improvement checklist is completed, my continuing education projects are expanding. By now, I've presented my workshops on the new hymnal, "*Glory to God*". Research on the one thousand pages of music and worship has produced many creative and meaningful ideas for the summer and fall. The Christian Education laptop is now equipped with software capable of Power Point Presentations. I've put together several hundred slides of music and information for the Presbyterian Women's Gathering. So, I know we can utilize the laptop for educational and worship purposes.

Another project I am excited about is low-tech and historical. I am studying the 1850 history involving the Presbyterian Church and Jenny Lind. On July 25th, I will tell her story as she traveled through Geneva on the train from New York City to Rochester. The Swedish Nightingale, promoted by B.P. Barnum on this American tour, was considered the first international star. The Presbyterian Church was the largest venue for a concert by such a star. However, Jenny Lind sang an assortment of sacred and secular music by Romantic composers such as Mendelsohn. The Presbyterian Church would not allow her to use any other instrument than piano (no violins or orchestra). So, Miss Lind stayed on the train and continued on to Rochester. Thus, I have decided to embody her spirit and sing her solos. Thank heavens, the Presbyterian Church has opened up to a variety of music styles and instruments in church.

We can be proud of The Presbyterian Church’s freedom of thought and spirit. However, I caution myself not to be too haughty. Our Reformed Belief calls us to consider how we respond to God’s liberation in Jesus Christ. What does Freedom mean for us today?

As we approach our nation’s Independence Day, consider the spiritual freedom we take for granted every day. Consider what freedom brings to your life. And, give it to someone else in love.

The Worship Committee would like to let people know that we will be celebrating Communion during the summer, on July 12th and August 2nd. For the summer months, Communion will be served in the front of the Sanctuary. Those who are able, we ask that they come forward to receive the sacrament, and upon returning, spend some quiet time in prayer and reflection. Those who are not able to come forward only need to simply indicate and they may be served from where they are seated.

Members seated on Washington Street -side of the church and the left side of the center pews will exit their pews and come down the interior isle, move forward, receive the bread, the cup, move to their left across the front of the Sanctuary and return to their pew from the exterior isle on Washington Street -side. Elders from the Worship committee will help to usher during Communion and to ensure that all are served.



A New Organ for the Chapel
Coming this Summer!

The church was fortunate to receive a generous donation by an anonymous donor for the purpose of replacing the Allen organ that has been a mainstay of the Chapel for decades.

A Music Task Force comprised of Pastor Deb, Virginia Champlin, Chris Wertman, Don Damick along with, Linda and Richard Cox got busy and traveled in order to hear and evaluate organs that would be suitable for that space. Their hard work has paid off and we are set to receive a new Roland Classic organ this summer!

The new organ will be in a dark oak cabinet that matches the communion table and other wood work in the chapel. The new unit will feature high-quality sounds from the Rodgers/Roland library; will have a newly designed concave pedalboard and a dual-manual tracker-action keyboard. These features will offer some continuity with the organ in the sanctuary, thus allowing for many of the same musical pieces to be played for both services.

The Allen organ is estimated to be approximately 60 years old and the goal is for it to find new life within the Geneva Presbytery.

Watch for future news about the new Roland Classic, as a Sunday dedication is being planned.

Dear Church Family,

I am considering starting a rice paddy in my back yard. (It's very wet.) . However, there is hope! I have noticed a big yellow ball in the sky for a few days in a row. It seems vaguely familiar. Unfortunately, the "big yellow ball", (I believe it's called the sun), can cause us some big problems if we don't enjoy it with care. So, I am reminding you all to use your sunscreen, wear hats, and hydrate when outside in the sun.

I was looking at the skin cancer section of the American Cancer Society website and decided to share with you what they have to say about skin cancers. First, Basal and Squamous cell cancers are the most common types of skin cancers. They are typically slow growing, but over time could spread inside the body and eventually enter vital organs if not treated. Melanoma is a less common but a highly aggressive type of skin cancer that needs treatment as soon as possible. All three tend to be found in areas where you are attempting to get that savage tan, most generally the head, neck, back chest and legs. (Never forget to check your EARS and SCALP for problems, I took care of a gentleman who developed melanoma on top of his head, he had wondered what the bump was, it ate into his brain.)

So now that I've totally horrified you, let's talk about melanoma. (Did I mention you could prevent it by using sunscreen, a hat, etc.?) Melanomas are similar to moles in some ways. They are generally a dark raised area on the skin. However, melanomas differ from moles as they are usually asymmetrical, (not round or oval), have ragged perimeters, contain a variation of colors, are larger than ¼ inch across and have a noted change of appearance over time. Something else to watch for is a sore that just won't heal, or heals and mysteriously opens again. If caught early, melanoma is removed and you are cured. If you wait too long, the outcome may not be as good. Basal cell and Squamous cell cancers seem a little less easy to describe, but they are very slow growing and seldom fatal. Squamous cell spots tend to be raised crusty patches that open and bleed on and off. Basal cell areas tend to be raised red shiny bumps that may open and bleed. (Did I mention you can prevent them with proper use of sunscreen, a hat, etc.?)

I will have info out during the summer months on skin cancer, and other summer safety issues. Call me with any questions. Have a safe, happy and healthy summer. God Bless, Beth (315-759-9039)

What can you give? What do you love, and how will you spend each day, celebrating this wonderful gift you've been given? It's a beautiful day. Let's help others enjoy it.
