James 1:17-27 ¹⁷Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above”

This fall I will continue to preach from the Biblical wisdom literature. Many appreciated my choice to leave the common lectionary and organize a Summer Sermon Series on the Psalms and Proverbs. So, I will continue preaching a Sermon Series in September on the Epistle of James, also considered to be wisdom literature in the New Testament. One of the common themes of James is “faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead” (James 2:17). Jesus often liberated people from their sins with the simple command, “Go, your faith has made you whole/well”. There seems to be no responsibility to the community. But, James and the leaders of the early Jerusalem church observed an apathy in the saved 1st century Christian. “Saved by grace” is the beginning of life as a Christian, not the end. James asks boldly, “What are you doing with your faith?”

James describes the social disparity in Jerusalem and appeals to the emerging middle class in the church to bridge the gap. Not unlike prophets and Jesus, James challenges his congregants to act on their faith, feed the poor in body and spirit.

I remember a poignant exchange when my teenaged son, John, challenged the mission of the church. At the top of the steps of the wealthy downtown church, he pointed to a poor man on the sidewalk. “How are we helping the poor? On a Sunday when the richest people are gathered inside this awesome church, what about the hungry people begging on the streets?” My young son’s wisdom did not fall on deaf ears.

Of course, there were plenty of programs, shelters, and community lunches during the week. However, Sunday is the one day where community lunches are seldom served. Except for a few churches like four downtown congregations in Minneapolis who combined their mission efforts to serve dinner, family style every Sunday.

“Feast” as it was named, was organized as a moveable feast, gathering at the Presbyterian Church one Sunday and the United Methodist, the next, the Baptist the next and so on. Creative variations on Sunday supper have emerged around the nation. Mission was never meant to be a cookie cutter vision. Mission is about meeting the needs of the community, bridging the gap, acting on our faith, envisioning a way to live out the commandment to love our neighbor, to find the lost, embrace the lonely, and feed the poor in body and spirit. Giving from our abundance. Being grateful for God’s love.

**This fall, The Presbyterian Church in Geneva will launch the next phase of our building renovation. Plans to improve the sanctuary acoustics, update Sunday school classrooms, remodel the south parlor and transform the conference room are in the making. Underlying all these improvements is a basic question for you. What ideas do you have to improve not only the building but our mission? How will we share our faith, our abundance, and these facilities with others? In all things, may God’s wisdom guide us as we build the church of the future.

Presbyterian Women invite you to assist with a Mission Project on Rally Day. The Geneva Food Pantry sometimes serves homeless people who are given emergency housing in local motels. They have small refrigerators and microwave ovens.

Last year we made over 80 Kitchen Kits for the Geneva Food Pantry to help these people prepare the food provided to them. The most important thing? A can opener!

On Rally Day, September 13th we will be making kits which will include can openers, paper plates, paper bowls, plastic silverware, and some paper towels. These will be put into a shoe box and stored in the Food Pantry Emergency supplies area. PW is purchasing the paper supplies and plastic silverware is being donated.

What you can do:

Bring in a hand can opener (Dollar Tree has some)

Bring in a large, sturdy, empty shoebox

Help put the items in the shoeboxes on Rally Day!



Dear Church Family,

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines a caregiver as “a person who provides direct care (as for children, elderly people, or the chronically ill).” In my experience, that definition is sadly lacking. People that I know who are caregivers pour their hearts and souls into caring for others. They frequently give up their own wants and needs to care for someone else they love.

There are mountains of issues that fall under this one topic. But, for this month I’d just like to touch on the issue of expectations leading into becoming a caregiver. Being a caregiver IS VERY HARD WORK. We often think we’ll just take care of each other till we can’t. But what happens then? The ostrich with the head buried in the sand approach does not seem to work well for most folks. Assuming daughter “Suzy” will just quit her great job in London and fly home to take care of Mom and Dad is not always reasonable. Expecting a spouse with back and cardiac issues to take care of all your needs after you have a highly debilitating stroke could wind up being deadly for both of you. There is no sure way to figure on what your future holds. Having frank discussions with family members, and knowing what your options are should your health and mental well being fail, is a good idea. Many people are shocked at the cost of assisted care and nursing homes. Nursing homes are generally \$100,000+ a year. On a fixed income, your money is gone quickly.

Talk to your children and spouses about life’s what if’s and what would be reasonable ways of handling life if things get rough. Be HONEST about what you can handle. Discuss with your lawyer how to handle your money issues if there is a possibility you could wind up in a nursing home. Anything you have “gifted” or given away within 5 years of going into a nursing home is counted as assets you need to pay prior to Medicaid paying for your nursing home stay. I am not a lawyer and do not know all the different available options. There are a number of ways to shield your assets if done in a timely manner. .

As a caregiver, do what you can. Don’t beat yourself up because you feel you should have done more. Don’t give in to others’ expectations. It is the wise and loving caregiver who says “Because I love you, I will let others do for you what I physically, mentally and emotionally can no longer do. I will continue to love you and do the best I can for you.”

Office Technology Update

On July 26th, we distributed and mailed Family Profile reports from Servant Keeper to all members and friends of the Presbyterian Church in Geneva. Over 350 letters were distributed or mailed and to date we have had over 177 returned to the church office as requested. If you have not returned your Family Profile, please do so that we can update our records.

Spouse or Head of Household

During the distribution of the Family Profiles, some members of the congregation expressed concern that Servant Keeper identifies one member of a couple as “Head of Household” and the other as “Spouse.” I contacted the vendor and learned that although this is the program’s default behavior that it is possible to rename “Head of Household” to another term after the couple has been added to the family.

If you noted on your returned Family Profile a concern over the term “Head of Household” then the term has already been changed to “Spouse.” If you did not and you have a concern, please call the church office or email me at ServantKeeper@pcgny.org so that I may address your concern.

The Chancel Guild Needs Volunteers

Chancel Guild members are volunteers who prepare communion and decorate the church for various occasions. They are responsible for:

- 1. Obtaining bread and juice for setting up the communion table once a month (~1.5 hrs to set up) and putting back the bread trays and juice glass trays (~10 min) after the elders wash them. A team of three members is in-charge for a three-month period.**
- 2. Soliciting church members to donate money for flowers in memory of or in honor of loved ones to be used for weekly services.**
- 3. After the 10:30 service, preparing the flowers (~10 min) for delivery by the head usher to church members in the hospital or nursing homes or those recovering at home.**
- 4. Arranging cornucopias in both chapel and sanctuary for the Sunday before Thanksgiving (2 hrs).**
- 5. Soliciting funds from church members for poinsettia plants and then arranging them in the chapel and sanctuary for Christmas (~1 hr).**
- 6. Overseeing the decoration of the chapel, sanctuary, fellowship hall and both entrances with wreaths, garlands, greens, etc. for the Christmas Season.**
- 7. Preparing palm stems for use on Palm Sunday (~1 hr).**
- 8. Soliciting funds from church members for potted flowering spring plants, which are then arranged in the chapel and sanctuary for Easter Sunday (~1 hr).**

The Guild holds meetings once or twice a year and always welcomes new members and the help of volunteers.
